## PRE-CONFERENCE SESSIONS

### Transforming Public Health Through Show-Me ECHO

Show-Me ECHO (Extension for Community Healthcare Outcomes) offers a global solution to strengthen public health and healthcare agency capacity by leveraging telehealth communication tools to deliver provider education. ECHO uses videoconferencing to connect interdisciplinary teams of experts with primary care clinicians, pediatricians, nurses, pharmacists, psychiatrists, behavioral health specialists, community health workers, school professionals, and other professionals. Participants collaborate virtually in interactive, case-based learning to develop advanced skills and best practices across a variety of health issues. This session will highlight the format, content, and outcomes of four impactful public health-related ECHOs: Vaping, Tobacco, and Nicotine Treatment; Pediatric Weight Management; Mothers, Infants, and Neonatal Abstinence Syndrome; and Certified Peer Specialists.

### Expanding Mental Health Access Through Existing LPHA Personnel or Partners

There is a scarcity of Mental Health services in many of our rural counties. One potential solution is to train existing LPHA nurses or personnel from partner organizations in a highly viable mental health method called EMDR (Eye Movement Desensitization and Reprocessing). Most people who are trained in EMDR have a psychology or counseling degree. However, anyone with a clinical degree can be trained in EMDR. A Nurse, Social Worker, School Counselor, Audiologist, Dietician, Occupational Therapist, or Physician Assistant could qualify. EMDR typically requires rigorous training that can take a long time to complete. However, through a special program offered by the Ozarks Public Health Institute (OPHI), a qualified person can complete the full training through a one-week intensive course. During the preconference session, staff from OPHI will describe the program and demonstrate techniques. First-responders who have completed the training will share how they are using EMDR in their field. OPHI will be accepting applications for an October 2024 class and will screen candidates and coordinate a full training package that includes lodging and lunch. Workforce dollars may be used to cover the cost of receiving this training.

### **Breaking it Down: The Role of Board Members in Protecting the Health of Missourians**

Becoming an elected leader does not come with an instruction manual. With that in mind, this presentation is designed to serve as a foundation for those serving on their county's Board of Health. This session will ensure that attendees understand the important role that LPHAs play in ensuring the health and wellbeing of Missourians; learn what the respective roles and responsibilities of Board members and LPHAs entail; and identify effective strategies to develop a solid relationship with their Administrator to ensure quality services are provided to the communities they serve. ### **Standardization of Performance Management System Evaluation & Reporting**

Having a strong Performance Management System is contributory to the growth and overall success of a public health agency. CCPHC launched a brand new Performance Management System on January 1st, 2023. This presentation examines the implementation of this new system, explaining how regularly scheduled (structured, cross-organizational) checkpoints helped to improve the system in real time, while identifying additional opportunities for standardizing supportive procedures, resulting in consistent evaluations and reports across the organization.

### **More Than a Registry: Intersecting OHCA Data with Public Health Practices to Improve Community Outcomes**

This presentation provides a comprehensive overview of the Missouri Cardiac Arrest Registry to Enhance Survival (CARES) program and how the evolution of data entry transformed into community programming and state support. Through our CARES Annual Report findings, it was determined that our OHCA data revealed statewide disparities that would require further intervention and initiative. With the advantage of benchmarking data, we wanted to further analyze whether new programming and partnerships could increase survival through bystander CPR and public AED use. We chose to incorporate public health themes and concepts to ensure community participation and equality of educational opportunities.

## Unequal Cities: Comparing Health Inequities in Missouri's Major Cities to 29 US Cities

Inspired by Benjamins and De Maio's 2021 book "Unequal Cities: Structural Racism and the Death Gap in America's Largest Cities", we compared black/white differences for selected health indicators for St. Louis City and Kansas City Missouri to the 29 "unequal cities" featured in their publication. A graph and narrative were created for each equity measure for St. Louis City and Kansas City for comparison to 29 major US cities for 2013-2017. These measures included black/white differences in all-cause mortality rates, life expectancy, years of life lost (YLL), leading causes of death, and other selected health outcomes. Sources of data included Missouri Public Health Information Management System (MOPHIMS) and local surveillance data available online through the St. Louis City and Kansas City Health Departments.

The platform will also feature the integration of secondary data from sources such as the American Community Survey (ACS), providing a richer context for analysis.

### **Strengthening Missouri's Public Health Infrastructure and Transformation Efforts Through PHAB's Accreditation Readiness Initiative**

In October 2023, the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services (DHSS) engaged with the Public Health Accreditation Board (PHAB) to launch a statewide initiative to support Local Public Health Agencies (LPHAs). DHSS leveraged Public Health Infrastructure Grant (PHIG) funds to bolster statewide transformation efforts, offering multiple support options to agencies pursuing accreditation. Among the support avenues, access to PHAB's Readiness Assessment to all 115 LPHAs serves as a stepping-stone towards Pathways Recognition or Initial Accreditation. The project offers training and office hours to all 115 LPHAs free-of-charge with additional incentive dollars for participation. This presentation will provide participants with an overview of how this initiative supports LPHAs in building a stronger public health infrastructure, including the direct benefits of the readiness assessment opportunity to LPHAs, including 1) identifying strengths and opportunities for improvement, 2) assessing performance across two nationally recognized models (the 10 Essential Public Health Services and Foundational Public Health Service framework), and 3) using the results to justify the need for additional investments in public health/funding allocations, advocacy, or garnering support.

## Pathways Internship Program: Year 1 in Review

This presentation will provide the results of the first year of the Missouri Pathways internship program that has been established through a collaborative effort between the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services, Missouri State University, and nine academic partners. This project is funding through a CDC grant focused on public health workforce development. This presentation will be important for LPHA leadership in Missouri to become aware of the results of the first year of the Pathways program, learn more about projects being completed, and to identify the benefits participating counties have received. LPHA and DHSS leaders can learn more about how to become an internship site. Students who are interested in public health careers will also find this information valuable as the program will fund up to 50 stipends (\$6400) to students upon completion of an 8-week internship at an LPHA or DHSS program area. As part of the broader Show-Me ECHO program in Missouri, the Building Healthy Communities ECHO, launched in 2022, focuses on supporting community-based collaborations to address health equity and community well-being. ## Open-Source Data Science in Action: Reading and Ingesting Faxed Reports with Python

In order to reduce the burden of time spent manually entering faxed reports into surveillance systems, BDMI staff at DHSS have built a program, utilizing open-source Optical Character Recognition (OCR) packages available within python, to automatically format, read, and normalize necessary data points into flat files which can be bulk uploaded into systems or incorporated into current internal ingestion processes/pipelines.
